

Our methodology

- 1) Conducted literature review
- 2) Interviewed 92 experts
- 3) Coded and analyzed data using Nvivo (qualitative data software)
- 4) Convened 30+ experts for an in-person meeting to ground truth findings
- 5) Worked with communications consultant on narrative development and messages

Failure to communicate effectively

Disenfranchised communities have been excluded or left out of transportation decision-making

Government misallocation & mismanagement of funds and resources

Six critical areas surfaced to the top

Siloed disciplines have prevented holistic solutions

Poor decision-making & weak leadership

Displacement is the result of unmanaged development & insufficient investment in people

6 strategies (+ 40 specific sub-strategies)

- 1. Reframe the transportation conversation
- 2. Allocate funding and resources equitably
- 3. Improve the quality and diversity of transportation leadership
- 4. Prioritize historically underrepresented communities in transportation decision-making
- 5. Work in unison to provide people-focused infrastructure
- 6. Invest in communities without displacement



How to:

Reframe the transportation conversation

- Educate the press
- Use trusted messengers
- Use demonstration projects as a communication tool
- Tell stories to change hearts and minds
- Create and share case studies and easy to understand fact sheets

Feature

#CrashNotAccident

- Campaign by Transportation Alternatives and Families for Safe Streets
- Change the way media communicates about traffic safety, urging them to use the term "crash" over "accident."
- Result: Associated Press issuing guidance to reporters to avoid using the term "accident"

- Fix federal policy by creating a national vision for transportation
- Fix state and local policy
- Build better projects

Smart Scale: Performance-based project scoring framework

(Virginia)

- VDOT updated how it selects projects for funding
- New framework uses 6 factors
 - o congestion mitigation,
 - o economic development,
 - accessibility,
 - safety,
 - environmental quality,
 - and (in areas with a population over 200,000) coordination with land use
- As a result, VDOT funds more Complete Streets projects

Improve the quality and diversity of transportation leadership





How to:

Improve the quality and diversity of transportation leadership

- Support and invest in the future of the field
- Hire more diverse leaders
- Redefine expertise
- Provide & require training
- Institutionalize the connection between health & transportation in higher education
- Prepare for new mobility and technology

Hire high school interns as part of transportation projects (Houston, TX)

- Together for Safer Roads worked with their member businesses, the City of Houston, and community groups to increase safety along a dangerous road in the Gulfton neighborhood.
- Invested over \$100,000 in staff time, technical consulting, and grant funding—matched many times over by the Houston Department of Public Works.
- Hired local high school students for a STEM-based summer internship.

Strategy#4

Prioritize historically underrepresented communities in transportation decision-making





How to:

Prioritize historically underrepresented communities in transportation decision-making

- Give up power and make space for disenfranchised communities to drive decision-making
- Remove barriers to participating
- Hire staff who are reflective of the community and pay community consultants for their expertise
- Organize opportunities for shared capacity building
- Use creativity and fun

Asian Media Access: Making engagement fun (Minnesota)

- Serving immigrants and refugees in Minnesota since 1992
- Strongly believes that community perspective needs to be the foundation for any discussion on transportation policy or design
- AMA uses a variety of techniques to better engage the immigrant and refugee community, including:
 - spray painting multilingual stencils on sidewalks to encourage walkability
 - hosting hot pot dinners to encourage deep and thoughtful community discussion
 - using Storybird (an online resource to create visual stories) to make sure seniors' voices are heard

Work in unison to provide people-focused infrastructure





How to:

Work in unison to provide people-focused infrastructure

- Build partnerships and relationships across disciplines
- Build political capital
- Create a diverse base of knowledge and skills within internal government teams
- Offer trainings and share resources across disciplines
- Make the transportation decision-making process easy to understand

Intersections: Creating Culturally Complete Streets (Nashville, TN)

- First-ever conference focused on Complete Streets implementation, creative placemaking, and equity.
- Brought together two distinct disciplines: transportation and the arts



"In 2018, I received an ArtPlace America scholarship to attend Intersections in Nashville. It was a turning point for my work, and the session with Oboi Reed on the power of place and mobility as vehicles for community transformation particularly resonated with me. I learned that walking, biking and art can be used as a strategy for neighborhood transformation. Increasingly, my work has focused on arts-based neighborhood organizing. I helped secure a nearly \$3 million infrastructure investment for my neighborhood. I also helped raise \$35,000 from developers, local businesses, and private foundations to pay artists during Open Streets Nashville."

Invest in communities without displacement






How to:

Invest in communities without displacement

- Measure displacement & reward projects that allow residents to remain in place
- Strengthen guardrails on existing investment tools
- Improve strategic coordination between transportation, housing, and land use
- Build shared prosperity through transportation investment

- Old bridge is being transformed into an elevated park, which will be a new civic space for healthy recreation, environmental education, and the arts.
- 11th Street Bridge Park team has been working for years to ensure that the park will be a driver of inclusive development
- Equitable development plan addresses four key areas:
 - workforce development,
 - small business enterprises,
 - housing,
 - and arts & culture.





Updating zoning practices

(Minneapolis, MN & Oregon)

 City of Minneapolis and the State of Oregon recently updated their zoning practices to allow for increased housing access.



- Minneapolis Updated their comprehensive plan to allow for more housing choice in single-detached housing neighborhoods.
- Oregon Passed a bill that will preclude zoning exclusively for single-detached housing in cities with populations larger than 25,000 across the state.






